Hugh Carswell

Mr. Hugh Carswell, Supervising Valuer and Representative of the Advances to Settlers Department at Invercargill, was born in the county of Bute, near Rothesay, Scotland, in 1840. He was educated in his native place, and was brought up to farming by an uncle. On arriving at Port Chalmers, in 1861, by the ship "Robert Henderson," he found employment on a farm for a time. Afterwards he went with the crowd to the Dunstan rush, but was satisfied in three months, and returned to agriculture.

In 1868 Mr. Carswell settled at Lower Blataura, and acquired a farm on which he resided for ten years. While still retaining this property he established himself in business as a stock and station agent in Invercargill in 1878, under the style of Carswell, White and Co. This business was sold to Mr. J. G. Ward (now Sir Joseph Ward) in 1894, and Mr. Carswell joined the Government service as Chief Valuer under the Advances to Settlers Department.

Mr. Carswell is an unattached member of the Masonic Order. He was one of the first members of the Toitoi Road Board, on which he served several years; for three years he was a member of the Invercargill Borough Council, and was on the Blulf Harbour Board for five years. Mr. Carswell was married, in 1874, to a daughter of the late Mr. John Anderson, of Wyndham station, and has five sons and four daughters.

James Carswell's diary, October 1847

Following is the tenth of monthly entries from the diary of James Carswell, Miller, at Dalbeattie, Kircudbrightshire.

October, 1847

1 Friday. Still dry. Mr Lewis wanting to put in the dam again. R Gilchrist wrought last night.



3 Sunday. Rather dull this morning but no rain. I am not at church. Took the lazy. Thomas was away at Crochmore (farm) shooting yesterday but I havn't heard how he came on. I have heard he shot 5 hares and 3 partridges. Mr Wilson sung at Dalbeattie church today. He has a singing school down at Colvend.

4 Monday. Still dry with very light water, but it appears to be some rain soon. Through at Indian corn.

5 Tuesday. Clear and dry this morning. Working barley and flour with very light water.

6 Wednesday. Dry this morning, but looks rather wet. Thomas was at Dumfries and bought 2 barrels of coal tar. Came on a very wet night – bought a new sheet for the horse.

7 Thursday. Tremendous wet night and the burn rising rapidly. There will be no want for the (milling?) not sure season. Dry in the afternoon.

8 Friday. Still showery. Through thrashing and working in the mill with plenty of water.

9 Saturday. Fine morning. Thrashed a rick of oats for Mr Keer (of) Richorn this morning. There was a partial eclipse of the sun this morning. Seems very fair.

10 Sunday. Soft morning – very dull with rain most of the day. I was not at church, at home all day. 11 Monday. Fine morning with plenty of water for mill purposes. Through thrashing and working in the mill.

12 Tuesday. Fine morning still for people getting up their potatoes. They have very fair quantity for the growth they had set, and of very good quality. Mr Templeton was at Castle Douglas singing last night.

13 Wednesday. Still dry. This is the day of Dalbeattie Fair and a very good day for this. My Father to Dumfries with Mr Hyslop (of) Firthead.

14 Thursday. Still dry. This is Dalbeattie fair day and a very poor turnout; thinner every year. Very few stands but plenty of nut stands. Some little hubbling, (quarreling?) but very little of any consequence.

15 Friday. Fine weather again, and the water in burn falling, with east winds. Plenty of drunk people about Dalbeattie. It will take the week before they get all settled.


16 Saturday. Fine day still. Oat meal is falling in value. It is worth about 22d per stone retail and not worth more than 20d or 21d wholesale. Barley about 2s . My Father bought some barley yesterday – weight 55 _ lbs per bushel per 4s per bushel. Retailing Indian meal at 15s. Fine barrel flour 2s-4p per stone

17 Sunday. Fine day but dill looking. I went up to Porterbelly and they were all well. No sermon at kirk.

18 Monday. Fine morning but came on wet in the afternoon. Thomas was at Corsock Bridge with a load of Indian meal. Tuesday. Through in the mill. Thrashing near all over, but plenty of Indian meal to grind.

19 Wednesday. Fine morning but wet in the afternoon. Thomas and Henry was at Dumfries but well wet when they came home. Robert Carswell came home from the herring fishing last Sunday morning, but he has not been at the Barr Home yet, came up this night. I think he is not going to marry her at this time. [Is Barr a family?Need to check -probably]

20 Thursday. This is the day of John Newall's funeral. He has been a long time poorly. Dreping mill-stones.



- 21 Friday. Very wild day. Came on rain in the afternoon and was a very wild wet night. Through grinding Indian (corn).
- 22 Saturday. Still very wild, and the water still rising. Indian corn rather cheaper in Liverpool, down (to about 32s per Quarter. The Bank of Liverpool has stopped, but is supposed will go on again. Tremendous failures in England and a few in Scotland.
- 23 Sunday. Dry but very wild. Wind westerly and very cold. I think there is some snow on the mountains. I was at church, heard Mr Arthur preach.
- 24 Monday. Fine morning. Thomas was away at Corsock Bridge with 160 stones of Indian meal.
- 25 Tuesday. Rather wild this morning. Through in the mill.
- 26 Wednesday. Very wild morning and very wet till about 9 o'clock, and there was a good day afterwards.
- 27 Thursday. Good day. Thrashed one of our corn stacks which came from _Culloch__ 33 bushels. Through in the mill.
- 28 Friday. Rather dull this morning. John Hannah was thrashing a rick of oats. Grinding Indian corn. It rose 1s per Quarter at last Tuesday's market in Liverpool.
- 29 Saturday. Fine morning. Came very wet in the afternoon, and it was a very wild night. I have got one part of the London (trade) Journal for the First (of the month?).
- 30 Sunday. Rather dull. I went to church. Mr Frazer was in Mr Arthur's place. There was a good many of the free church people, there being no sermon.
